The Drive-in Diner Classic cars graced the parking lot of the Cedar Shack, a well-loved drive-in restaurant in Sweet Home, Oregon to order their last burger of choice, and to say goodbye to a long held tradition. The Cedar Shack closed for good after the last order went out through the front slider window. Death in the family I heard somewhere. Whatever the reason, folks from all over the country can tell tales of stopping for lunch on their way here or there. Some once children brought their children, and their grandchildren. A sad day for all concerned. The first drive-in diner was created in 1921 in Dallas, Texas. Kirby's Pig Stand would pave the way for iconic drive-in restaurants popping up across the nation. Route 66 had one every mile it seemed. Catchy names, neon lights, and even waitresses on roller skates. The drive-in was our go-to place to hang out. These places in the Americana culture were shown in movies, especially in the 1950s and 60s. Teens adopted these local burger joints as their home-away-from home. They showed off their hot rods, moreover, it was the perfect place to find a date and go "cruising". It was exciting times! The movie American Graffiti captured the era. Cars, music, graduation, love. It is all there at the diner.

Thoughts from the Salem Roadster Show

This weekend the 2023 Salem Roadster Show held its annual invitational car show at the Oregon State Fairgrounds in Salem. Invitational is the key here. One does not just assume they can show their classic, custom, or retromod car in this type of car show. This is where you find the best of the best on display. There are no judges, awards or cars that are not cream of the crop! Vendor booths that line the walls cater to the needs for each type of project, and give an air of promise that if you give them your project, they will create your "dream car"; some of the creations they have done are displayed to add a little vision to a dream. Knowing the lingo is important before you begin your project. The average "Joe" may never hear these terms enough to understand what they are actually seeing as they walk the isles of the annual event. Classic cars are cars that once were sold by dealerships of each generation. The owner tries to bring it back to the original glory by searching high and low for original parts, which can be as small as an interior light fixture. Swap meets are full of seekers of original parts. A young girl whose name I do not know, polishes the bumper of a 1956 Chevy four-door, It was a close to the new as she could get it. She just needs to keep the car clean and maintained. This type of car can be purchased relatively inexpensively and used as a "daily driver". They generally are just driven to the venue. Custom cars are cars that start out as one car but are heavily modified with body changes (could have flare fenders or chopped top ect.) to create a specific look. The paint, wheels, interior, have all been selected carefully to achieve a very fancy car. They can have many trophies placed along the floor. This is the "eye candy". Women like to see the shiny paint, the beautiful interiors, and the men most often "drool " over all the chrome inside the engine bay and under the vehicle. Some put the car up on blocks with mirrors on the floor to show off the underside. High dollar as you can imagine. Custom cars are usually transported in an enclosed trailer. Rarely has this author seen one driven. Rat rods are a junk yard version of a custom. Jalopy is a upscale rat rod type, The real hero of the shows in my opinion are the restomods. In a nutshell, a restomod is a combination of the words "restored" and "modified" and is a seamless combination of both the old and new. A perfect example is a 1964 Datsun Pickup owned by Ken & Lynn Parsons of Roseburg. Ken found the little truck he has named "Puddle Jumper" in Tangent, Oregon. He didn't give more than a few dollars for it, but had an idea to make it a "daily driver". Ken has owned a classic muscle car, a Matador red 1970 Oldsmobile 442 After selling it he decided to build a jalopy. This one he had fun doing odds and ends to. A 1929 Ford Model A Pickup. He had a lot of unique items on the car I.E. chain drive steering being one of those things. Ken has won many awards on iy. Neither of those cars make a good "daily driver". The Datsun would fit the bill! Ken drug it home, began the painstaking work of repairing, replacing, and creating to make this what he had in mind. Being a metal fabricator, Ken made his own parts, replacing broken brackets and such, He created a special air cleaner out of a kitchen pot, and did a truly fantastic job as he did anything he could to restore, repair, and make a safe and paint the little
